Chapter one

Well, today I started writing the next Gamache book. Set up the old clunky laptop by the fireplace in the living room. Put out a café au lait and a few biscotti...gathered myself in a moment of quiet...then started to write.

Dear Lord, is it scary!

But it is also exhilarating. When I was young I barely dared to dream that one day I'd get to do this. To write. And to make a living at it.

What makes this so wonderful is that I genuinely love the characters, and the setting. Though starting a first draft is still terrifying. But, to be honest, it's less scary than it once was. Back in the earlier books I was afraid of everything. That the book would be awful, that you'd be disappointed, that my publishers would be disappointed. That I couldn't do it. That there was magic involved and it wouldn't appear this time.

Now I know I can do it. I know I can write a book. Yes, there's definitely magic involved – some alchemy. But that alchemy kicks in in direct proportion to the courage I can muster. Not just to get to that laptop, but to dare myself. To see the edge, and go beyond it. Does this make sense?

I think, more than anything, I'm afraid of producing a mediocre book. Of playing it safe. One of the great challenges in writing a series, with many of the same characters and much the same setting, is not writing the same book. Falling into a pattern, a routine. I can guarantee you that few writers do that on purpose. It just happens.

And I sure don't want it to happen to me, and you.

The only way I know not to do that is to accept that while the surface is much the same (Armand Gamache, Clara, Ruth, Beauvoir et al – and Three Pines) what lies beneath is always different. These books are about crimes – that's a constant – but that's also superficial.

What they're really about is what changes. And that's both the great thrill of writing them, and the terror. That I'll chicken out. Get to the edge of the precipice, of the unknown, and hesitate.


Pretend to leap, to look, to have the courage to head into the dark. But to not really do it.







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Perhaps that's why my first drafts are so messy. To be honest, I think I head forward, then back up, then gather myself and head forward again. A Lewis and Clark expedition led by the Cowardly Lion.

Takes a while. Isn't pretty. But I get there eventually.

And 'there' is the uncomfortable theme. The 'why' of the crime – the 'why' of people's reactions. The 'why' of what Armand and Jean-Guy and Annie and Clara and Myrna are choosing to do. In this book we learn more about Myrna – one of my favorite characters. And, of course, so many of the threads and themes and events that have been building explode in book 9.

So I need to get it right. For your sake and for mine.

Perversely, the stability I feel in Three Pines – the affection I have for the main characters – allows me to drill down.

I have to say, biscotti helps too. And doughnuts. And hot cross buns. Toasted, With butter. Oh oh.

So that's where I'm at now – beginning to write book 9.

But what I'm really excited about me right now is book 8. THE BEAUTIFUL MYSTERY will be published in the United States and Canada on August 28th!! Heard from my UK publisher, Little, Brown. Dan Mallory, my editor there, says he's read THE BEAUTIFUL MYSTERY three times – including once just for fun – and will read it again soon. He describes it as a 'modern classic'. I sure hope he's right!

The US publisher, Minotaur Books, is certain it's the best Gamache book to date – and we're all excited for the launch and the tour! I can hardly wait for you to read it.

It's set in a cloistered monastery, where the monks have taken a vow of silence, and yet sing chants of such astonishing beauty, their voices transcend reality. They have the power to take listeners to places they'd never reach on their own. The chants transport both listener and singer.

The power of these chants is called, 'the beautiful mystery'. But for one monk, the place the music takes him is anything but beautiful.

This isn't a book about religion. It's about belief – and the courage to defend those people and things you believe in - for the monks, and for Gamache and Beauvoir, who find themselves within those impenetrable walls. And who find their beliefs severely and perhaps fatally challenged.

The book is dedicated to: Those who kneel down, and those who stand up.

I sure hope you like it!
